

## Rabbi, Is There a Blessing for a Vaccine?

Of course, this is a modern take on the many quotable lines from the classic musical *Fiddler on the Roof*, in which the rabbi is asked: “Is there a blessing for a sewing machine?”...and “Is there a blessing for the Czar? Of course, he answers (it was always a he back then), “May God bless and keep the Czar.... far away from us!” We could say the same for the Covid-19 virus.

But now we have a vaccine, and there is no better time to explore the important relationship between Judaism and science and medicine, which has existed since the beginning. Unlike some religious traditions, there is no conflict whatsoever. Judaism sees science as an insight into a deeper understanding of God’s beautiful and intricate creation and medicine as a way to partner with God toward the mitzvah of healing. Vaccines are certainly an extension of that.

I invite you to delve deeply into the mind of the rabbis and Jewish texts on the subject [here](#) or [here](#), with an article titled [Halachic Aspects of Vaccination](#), written by Rabbi Edward Reichman, M.D. However, to paraphrase these two footnoted articles, principles of modern medicine mirror Jewish ethics on the subject. As Jews, we are required to protect our bodies and maintain our health—we are not permitted to harm our bodies. Our sages have a history of forbidding many things that entail a danger to human life.

As it relates to vaccines specifically, rabbis have been debating this since 1785, when they began discussing the first crude and risky inoculations against smallpox. As modern science has advanced, so has Jewish thinking, and today some rabbis go as far as saying that an individual who refuses to be vaccinated during an epidemic is like an indirect killer who is liable for punishment. The consensus is that we must all obey the advice of doctors, medical facts and proven medicine. One does not rely on miracles or even herd immunity: even if nine were not vaccinated and did not die, the tenth must get vaccinated.

As a people who are also concerned with equity, as liberal Jews, we applaud Governor Murphy’s approach. Given the limited initial supply, New Jersey is seeking to balance equal access to the vaccine while vaccinating our most vulnerable population first. The policies endeavor to maintain enough control to ensure priority for those most likely to fall ill while not demanding so much control as to waste precious time and medicine. We can also be proud of Jersey City (thank you, Mayor Fulop!) for having the foresight to be one of the only municipalities to establish its own vaccination pods and programs in our local wards. Our tradition teaches that doing a mitzvah is meritorious, but making it possible for others to perform a mitzvah is of even greater merit. After almost a year with so much disease, death and social isolation, the wisdom of our sages rings as loudly and aptly today as ever:

*If I am not for myself, who will be for me?  
If I am only for myself, what am I?  
And if not now, when? (Mishna, Pirkei Avot)*




*1st in a new interview series*



## Rabbi's Message *(continued from page 1)*

As clergy eligible for the vaccine, I had the opportunity to be inoculated in January in Jersey City. It was there I saw firsthand how many people are doing the holy work of coordinating and offering the vaccine. Perhaps more importantly, I learned there how Temple Beth-El can be an agent to this mitzvah. You may have read that once a vial of medicine is opened, it must be used within a limited time or be thrown away. This means that if someone doesn't show up for their appointment or if an extra dose is squeezed out of open vials with no one to receive it in that moment, wasted is the opportunity of the mitzvah of saving an additional life. This is an ethically egregious situation.

As you may have read, I have started an "on call/standby" list. To aid in coordinating occasional possible "end of the day" leftover vaccines, I am keeping a list of those currently *eligible* for a vaccine and able to leave at a moment's notice to be vaccinated. To sign onto this list, please fill out our form by clicking [here](#).

Signing up for this list should *not* be instead of signing up for an appointment on the NJ State site; nor does signing up guarantee a vaccine. However, I am very gratified that so far we have secured vaccines for 11 eligible members of Temple Beth-El. Please do fill out this form only if you are currently eligible under state guidelines.

Being your rabbi is a privilege. I feel tremendous gratitude to be able to witness and be present for our community during powerful and sacred moments of life and transition. However, the opportunity to facilitate immunity to this dreadful disease that has stolen so much from us all is perhaps the greatest honor that has been bestowed upon me in this role.

*So, rabbi, is there a blessing for a vaccine?* As you can imagine, receiving the vaccine is a very emotional experience, one that will inspire words of awe and blessing. As the light at the end of this dark tunnel grows brighter and more clearly into view, more and more of us will be, please God, rolling up our sleeves. And in that moment, I invite you to reflect on that holy moment and utter your own words of blessing. I have to admit that I had a number of blessings prepared in anticipation, but the opportunity to be vaccinated came upon me so fast, I left them all at home. So, in the moment I relied on this one, the traditional prayer for the human body I often find very meaningful:

*Blessed are You, Adonai, our God, Sovereign of the universe, who formed the human body with wisdom and skill; creating the body's many pathways and openings. It is well known before Your seat of glory that if even one of them would be opened, or if even one of them would be sealed, it would be impossible to survive and to stand before You even for one hour. Blessed are You, Adonai, who heals all flesh, working wondrously.* (Siddur)

However, if you have more time to prepare for that moment than I did, you may want to offer one or more of these contemporary and traditional choices [here](#). Alternatively, I invite you to compose your own.

One final word about blessings. (Remember, there is a blessing for everything!) Did you know that our Jewish tradition has a blessing for when you see a person after being apart for more than one year? One day soon, we will be physically reunited with our loved ones, families and community in full presence and full embrace. It is too early to know when that will be, but not too early to be excited for that moment. So, in anticipation of that moment, the blessings is:

*Baruch ata Adonai eloheinu melech ha-olam mechai-yay hameitim.* ברוך אתה יי אלהינו מלך העולם מחייה המתים

The translation of this blessing is bittersweet in our day: *Blessed are you Adonai, Sovereign over all time and space, who enlivens the dead.* Even while we profoundly mourn those who we have lost to this terrible plague, we look forward to the day in which our days, our relationships and our communities come back to life!



## Family Promise during Covid-19

Over five years ago, Temple Beth-El began working with congregations throughout the area to launch Family Promise of Hudson County. Family Promise has provided hosting opportunity for working families, so they can stay together while struggling to get back on their feet and move to a new home. Many have lost jobs or suffered other adverse circumstances, leaving them temporarily homeless. Family Promise provides social services for these people to find jobs and housing and return to the normalcy of their lives as a family.

Prior to the pandemic, Temple Beth-El participated by hosting four or five families, all with children, to sleep over in Temple Beth El's Social Hall, four times a year. After a full day of school and work the families returned to Temple Beth El for dinner and evening activities. Enter Covid-19 and this plan came to a screeching halt, as you can well imagine.

But the work continues, albeit in different ways. Especially in this current crisis, there are so many people in great need of our help.
