From home.

Shalom friends,

Purim, was (at the time I'm writing this) just a little over two weeks ago, but it seems like worlds away. Each passing day has felt like a week or more. Each passing precaution feels quaint in its inadequacy. Like most of you, Steve and I don't leave the house but for absolute essentials and everything brought into the house is greeted with disinfectant. Our homes have also become our offices, our schools, our social centers and then some.

The Jewish tradition makes a very big deal of drawing distinctions. We make distinctions between sacred and ordinary; permitted and forbidden; ethical and unethical; thought and deed and much more. While we are right to question fixed boundaries of the past, we must never forget that boundaries in and of themselves serve vital functions in every area of culture, life and even in nature.

Our need for boundaries has come into focus in recent days as we live in undifferentiated space and time; in space as our families recreate entire institutions within the confines of our homes; in time as day flows into day with the seemingly unending news and necessary responses to COVID-19.

To preserve our health and lives during this pandemic, we have created physical distinctions. We erect boundaries between the people with whom we live and those from whom we must physically distance; the stuff in our homes which is germ free, and the stuff outside with which we must take precautions. But can we take the same care with metaphysical boundaries? Now that we are working, sleeping, eating, learning, playing, laughing, worrying and socializing all in the same space and seemingly at the same time—how can we think about creating sacred distinctions? Can we create work-free places and/or hours? News-free time zones? Can we create sacred family time free from all electronics? (Shabbat is a perfect time for this, BTW.) Family game time? Couples connection time? How about creating a little ritual or intention to transition in and out of these experiences? Experts (including one astronaut who spent an entire year in space cooped up in his spacecraft) suggest that sticking to rituals and schedules is essential to mental health and optimal functioning.

Our Jewish tradition's *raison d'être* has always been to sustain us in health, goodness, justice and peace. Sacred distinctions drive the vehicles to living those values. We need a little Shabbat, in space and time, every day. Try making little Shabbat breaks during the week, leading up to a day that feels different. Allow this rest to be your holy work of self-care. This, too, is a mitzvah.

Of course, in the midst of all this fear and uncertainty, we are also mourning the loss of family and community togetherness at Passover. As the holiday approaches, I feel the void even more palpably. As heartbroken as we were to do it, we know it was the right thing to cancel our communal seder. In its place Cantor Wallach and I are offering two workshops on April 1 and 2 to empower you to create meaningful *s'darim* at home during these challenging days electronically or in your home groups. I have created a Google doc full of resources to help you with this [here](#). Cantor Wallach's Zoom session will be recorded to aid you in learning the Passover songs by repetition. She will also distribute her song sheets. In addition, we are creating a virtual meal match resource. If you would like to partner with others to create a seder experience over a videoconferencing format, let our office manager, Bob Kahan, know at [admin@betheljc.org](mailto:admin@betheljc.org). We are eager to help create these partnerships but unfortunately are not able to assist with the technology aspect of it.

## Notes from home *by Rabbi Leana Moritt (continued from page 1)*

There is a prayer from our daily morning blessings of gratitude for every-day miracles that has been resonating with me these days. It reads: בָּרוּךְ אַתָּה יְהוָה אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֶלֶךְ הָעוֹלָם, מַתִּיר אֲסֹרִים:

It is usually translated: blessed are you Adonai our God, Sovereign of all time and space, who frees the captive. This prayer begs the question, if we are not in prison, why would we still say this daily prayer? Additionally, our sages taught that even one who is imprisoned should say this prayer daily. Why, they answer, is because even though we might be physically imprisoned, we must remember that we are never spiritually or mentally imprisoned. Our physical limitations never define us.

We have always been a resourceful people who use all our traditions many gifts and teaching to embrace life fully even in times of distress, and these last many weeks are no different than it has in our long history. It has been so incredible to watch how our community has banded together to keep what makes us special going almost without skipping a beat: virtual Kabbalat Shabbat services; virtual Religious School and Tot Shabbat; Neighbors Helping Neighbors with food, medicine and caring phone calls; keeping our Food Pantry stocked, up and running; bar mitzvah tutoring; the list goes on and on. (It's all on our website.) One of our dear congregants who lost a family member told me that so many people responded over phone and videoconferencing, she was holding an all-day virtual shiva! She felt so loved and supported. This is all a testament to our being connected, grounded in our tradition and free. What an important message to remember this Passover!

We don't know how long this quarantine and pandemic will last, and we don't know what the long-term effects will be. For many, if not all of us, the hardship will get worse before it gets better. Some of the impact we cannot yet imagine. Still, I know that you, who make Temple Beth-El what it is, will use all your creativity and resourcefulness to be there for one another for the community and for our Temple, who, keeps us together and grounded like so many generations who came before us.

Wishing you a sweet, liberating and joyful Passover with blessings for health and equanimity during these challenging days.

We started and still prioritize our seniors and disabled folks, but very soon realized that the social distancing necessitated by this pandemic isn't hard only on them.


*If you are living alone or are now out of work, we want to know.*

## A Note about the Temple Beth-El Weekly Food Pantry

**Wednesdays 5:30—7:00 pm**



By now, we hope you are heeding the advice of our federal, state, and local public health officials to engage in aggressive "social distancing," avoiding crowded places and limiting your contact with other people as much as possible. For many of us, that means an extended stay indoors with our families and loved ones. These are stressful times for all of us, as we worry about the lack of food in grocery stores and the closure of restaurants that we normally rely on for food.

For many of society's most vulnerable people, however, these stresses are immensely magnified. The people who visit Temple Beth-El's food pantry are often homeless or live in severely dilapidated housing conditions. While we worry about being cooped up at home, they may not have a home to be cooped up in. While we worry about cooking dinner every night, they may not have a functional kitchen to cook in. And while we worry about depleting our financial reserves, they lack any financial savings or source of income.

During these difficult times, then, it is all the more essential that we keep our food pantry open as long as possible. To do so, we need your help. Here are some ways you can help serve our pantry:

**1. DONATE.** We rely on personal donations of food to keep our pantry running. Please consider making a contribution.

a. For ease, we have set up an Amazon Wishlist, available [here](#). We've even created a QR code that takes you right to it (see below). You can have your items ordered directly to Temple Beth-El, 2419 John F. Kennedy Boulevard, Jersey City, NJ 07304. We also encourage you to set up a "subscribe and save" monthly order for your donation. We are happy to provide donation receipts for your taxes.

b. You can also, of course, purchase food and bring it to the temple. Please coordinate with our office manager, Bob Kahan, at [office@betheljc.org](mailto:office@betheljc.org), for a time to drop off your donation. You can also bring your donation to the pantry when it is open on Wednesday evenings.

c. If you cannot donate food, you can make a financial donation by clicking [here](#). Please mark the designation "Something else" and write "food pantry" in the comments box.

**2. VOLUNTEER.** Our pantry is open on Wednesday evenings, and we need volunteers from 5:30—7:00 pm. Volunteers will pack bags starting at 5:30 pm; the pantry opens at 6:00 pm and stays open until approximately 6:30 pm, at which time volunteers close the pantry and clean up.

a. Please sign up via our Sign Up Genius link [here](#). Please do not come to the pantry without signing up. We want to ensure appropriate social distancing by having only 2-3 volunteers at any given time.

b. We will practice appropriate hygiene and social distancing at the pantry, including: (1) volunteers must wash hands immediately upon entering the building; (2) volunteers must wear gloves while packing and handing out food (which will be provided); (3) bags must be handed out directly from volunteers to pantry visitors at the front door — no rummaging through bags or items, and no visitors allowed inside the building at all (including the foyer).

Thank you so much for your support in keeping our food pantry running during these difficult times. And please stay safe and well.

## PURIM BAGS FOR ALL (or almost all)

I'd like to thank everyone who participated in the Purim Bag appeal. Twenty-six members donated to support providing bags for all members and staff. Their names are on the Purim Bag letter that everyone received with their bag (and are listed on page 10 of this newsletter). Seventeen members donated so we could hand out bags at Welcome Home Jersey City (see page 10 as well), and 10 members donated a total of \$529 to the Food Pantry. It was the most successful Purim Bag fundraiser in all the years we have been doing this.

During Religious School on Sunday March 1, **Dave Barr, Kevin Goldberg, Celeste Moore** and I filled 200 bags. The Purim Bag letters were folded in thirds by **Sarah Cohen, Laura Katzive, and Jeff Tartikoff**.

After Religious School, Nancy Sambul met with **Judith Schteingart** and the TBE Youth Group. Together, we filled 49 bags to be distributed to children at Welcome Home Jersey City's Fun Club. A special thank you to Jake for devising the idea of our Bag Hats.



We began distributing Member and Staff Purim Bags at the Potluck Dinner/New Member Shabbat on Friday, March 6. Most bags were picked up and distributed during and after Religious School on Sunday, March 8, with a few handed out at the Purim Shpiel on Monday evening (plus **Michelle Pievsky** took home a few more bags to distribute).

Normally, we also distribute more bags the following Sunday at Religious School, but we were closed by then. So, unfortunately, one Hoboken Religious School family did not get their bag/letter. We were also unable to deliver 25 bags throughout Jersey City: four in zip code 07305; three in zip code 07306; and four in zip code 07307. There were 14 in zip code 07302 – one in Paulus Hook, five in Van Vorst Park, two on Newark Ave, five in Harsimus Cove, and one in Hamilton Park. I am hoping that next year we can find members in these specific Downtown neighborhoods and these other zip codes so that everyone gets their bags.

Fortunately, these bags did not go to waste. They were distributed at the Food Pantry on March 11.

Finally, on Thursday, March 12 (at the last meeting of Welcome Home Jersey City's Fun Club prior to having to shut down due to the pandemic), all 49 bags were distributed to the children.


