

Finding Light and A Light Heart in That Last Cruise of Oil

Rabbi Aryeh Kaplan was once asked if there are any jokes in the Talmud, and his response was, “yes, but they’re all old.” We truly have it all in our literature and culture—from the profound mysteries of existence and the passionate care for the world and its ills to the bawdy, delicious, and rip-roaring funny. Part of the richness of Judaism is embracing the fullness of the human experience, with all that it offers.

I’ll tell you another thing that’s feeling old. This pandemic and the never-ending cycle of bad news. It feels like there is constant heaviness in the air. So, when we sat down to think about how we should celebrate Hanukkah as a community this year, it became clear that what we all need is a little bit of light. Yes, yes, we bring in the candles’ light to remember the Maccabees’ victorious defeat of the Greek-influenced Assyrians. That, too, is an old story and this is our history. But the genius of being Jewish is our tradition’s malleability of meaning. So, this year, our Hanukkah light will be all about lightness and laughter. This year, when so many of us are feeling like there’s just not much oil to keep our fires burning, we are going to make Hanukkah all about keeping it light. Instead of our usual latke feast and Hanukkiah lighting (sigh!), we will gather on Zoom on Tuesday, December 15 at 5:30 to bring in the light of laughter and fun. Together, we’ll play some trivia (win a prize!); sing some songs; crack some jokes; watch some humor, drink some wine (?), eat some donuts (BYO); and bring in the light together. Together we will laugh and lighten our hearts.

A Jewish joke, goes one definition, is one that a non-Jew doesn’t understand and every Jew says they have already heard. So to warm us up for our December 15 event (See pages 3—4 for details), here are a couple of classics:

The (loving) Jewish mothers joke





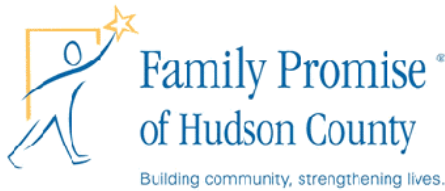

Family Promise during Covid-19

Over five years ago, Temple Beth-El began working with congregations throughout the area to launch Family Promise of Hudson County. Family Promise has provided hosting opportunity for working families, so they can stay together while struggling to get back on their feet and move to a

new home. Many have lost jobs or suffered other adverse circumstances, leaving them temporarily homeless. Family Promise provides social services for these people to find jobs and housing and return to the normalcy of their lives as a family.

Prior to the pandemic, Temple Beth-El participated by hosting four or five families, all with children, to sleep over in Temple Beth El's Social Hall, four times a year. After a full day of school and work the families returned to Temple Beth El for dinner and evening activities. Enter Covid-19 and this plan came to a screeching halt, as you can well imagine.
