She is founder and CEO of the nonprofit organization AngelaCares, Inc., which serves as an advocate and support system for senior citizens and their caregivers and as a mentor to youth by educating and empowering them to volunteer. She is also the owner of Care About You, LLC, which provides consultant services to assist the elderly. She conducts speaking engagements, training, mentoring and business consulting as the "Carepreneur" and has self-published a book titled *Caregiver's Guide to Helping Seniors Eat Healthy*. She is also a rising Tide Capital Community Business Academy Instructor.

Ms. McKnight is vice-chair of the Greenville Community Partnership (Jersey City), Chair of Hudson County Long Term Recovery Committee, and Board Member of Family Success Center, Jersey City Community Charter School and United Way of Hudson County among other community organizations. She is a recipient of numerous Jersey City awards, including the Sandra Cunningham 2012 "It's All About You" award, Jersey City's 15th annual "Women of Action" award, 2015 Pioneer Wall of Fame, 2016 Young Women Making Moves Community Leader of the Year, Fifteen Together Foundation 2017 Stellar Community Service Award, Chosen Generation Ministerial Alliance Hidden Figures 2017 Award, Learning Community Charter School 2018 Gala Honoree Award and JCFW 2018 Person of Influence Award.

Ms. McKnight currently resides in her hometown of Jersey City. She is a mother of two children (17 and 25), happily married to her high school sweetheart and a grandmother to her first grandson.

Message from the Rabbi

We buried the words but not the prayers. We gathered just before the winter frost at an open grave at Mount Moriah, our beautiful congregational cemetery, to bid an honorable and fitting farewell to the sacred books that had served our congregation for so many years.

Our *siddurim* (prayerbooks) are sacred in the same way a human body is sacred; they are both holy vessels. We bury them both when they are no longer able to serve the purpose for which they were created. The human body is sacred as the vessel that contains our souls. When the body is ensouled, we live; we love; we praise; we are God's partners in creation and *tikkun* (repair). The siddur is sacred as a vessel that contains the words (or springboards) to our people's prayers. When the siddur is used, the words flow through the pray-er in discernment and wonder; questioning and probing; yearning and jubilation; sorrow and joy. The words are not the prayers. We are the pray-ers. Both the body and the books are vessels that serve to connect us to the Holy One during our lives.

At the end of our days, we entrust the body to the earth, from which it came and understand the soul returns to its Source. It is the same way with our *siddurim*. There too, we entrusted our books to the earth. At the end of our ceremony, I invited all in attendance to take a moment of silence to recall a moment of connection and wonder they experienced with those books and send those up to our Source as prayers as well.

It's not just any book that gets this kind of treatment. It's not even any Jewish or Hebrew book. We only bury books that contain one particular and special name of God in Hebrew often called the Tetragrammaton. This is the unpronounceable 4-letter name of God (*Yud-heh-vav-hay*). While we often pronounce the name as "Adonai," it is really just a substitute. Because that particular name is so shrouded in awe and mystery, many pronounce that name Hashem, which simply means, "The name." This particular name carries so much respect, that books, scrolls, and *sifrei Torah* which carry this name are treated with special care. For example, they are not put on the floor nor carried into bathrooms. And they are buried at the end of their useful lives. While the Reform Movement allows for recycling individual sheets of paper with this name that were designed for temporary use, burial is deemed appropriate for books such as ours.



Over the last couple of months since we began tidying up, many of us intuited this. We would come across a pile of books to donate or recycle and pause when we got to these special books. Everyone knew they needed to be treated differently. How could they possibly just go in the discard pile with all the rest? Since adopting the new *Mishkan Tefila siddurim* and *Mishkan Hanefesh machzorim*, these older books were certainly outdated, but throwing them away in the garbage seemed unthinkable. We weren't going back to them and we couldn't give them away either. Though we tried, the truth is that there aren't any other congregations needing any more of those old volumes either.

And so it is as we face the new year at Beth-El. Together we are tidying up—honoring and looking critically at the old and making room for some new. Next time you are at the temple, take a look at our Book Room. With the space we created by burying the books, we now have room for our weekly Food Pantry supplies which feeds the hungry. On the balcony, we now have room for extra seating we will use now that we have fewer pews downstairs. (And, thanks to Karen Seemen-Pinn and her Religious School monthly Parent Project Team, it is all really organized, too!)

Installation Weekend -- December 7-9, 2018

It was a joyous weekend at Temple Beth-El, starting on Friday night, December 7 (30 Kislev), when Rabbi Leana Moritt was installed as the 15th Rabbi in the 154-year history of Temple Beth-El.

The evening began with a wine-and-cheese reception and, as it was the 6th night of Hanukkah, we had our traditional Hanukkiah-lighting ceremony before the service. This took place in the rear of the Sanctuary, where, just a few days earlier, a company had removed our extra pews.

Rabbi Rex Perlmeter, a longtime congregational Rabbi and the Founding Director of the Jewish Wellness Center of Montclair, led the service, gave a rousing sermon and performed the Installation Ceremony. Fr. Joseph Ciccone, Pastor at Saint Joseph Mission Church, joined in the Priestly Benediction, reminisced about his friendship with Rabbi Moritt, and gave a lovely blessing.



Student Cantor Stefanie Greene co-led the service with Rabbi Perlmeter and was supported by members Merrick Brodsky, Michael Noveck and Laraine Schwartz. She lent her beautiful voice to the occasion from the first blessing over the Hanukkah candles to the closing song, a reprise of "Not By Might." We were also graced by the Temple Beth-El Junior Choir and by a group of congregational singers, both led by Student Cantor Greene.

We had nearly a full house as members, friends and local dignitaries joined a whole host of rabbis as well as clergy and leaders of other faiths. We wrapped up with a sumptuous Oneg Shabbat to top off this sweet evening.

Our Saturday Morning Shabbat Service was co-led by Rabbi Steven Kushner and Student Cantor Greene. Rabbi Kushner's participation was very moving, and he gave us a special Dvar Torah for the occasion. We finished with a festive lunch...but that's not all!



Sunday was also a special day at Temple Beth-El as our Religious School celebrated both Hanukkah and Rabbi Moritt's installation. We held a lovely service in which we consecrated our newest religious school students.

Thanks to all the participants and to Sonia Schulman and her Transition Committee for making everything happen.

Family Promise 2019 and YOU

We are pleased to share that Temple Beth-El will be hosting Family Promise again in 2019. Our first dates are February 10 through 17. Temple Beth-El successfully completed our 2018 hosting of temporary homeless families through the program established by Family Promise of Hudson County.

Rabbi Hachen introduced Temple Beth-El and Hudson County to Family Promise, four years ago after her prior congregation participated in the Bergen County Program. Many of you are already familiar with the program, which provides hosting opportunity for working families so they may stay together -- boys and girls, fathers and mothers, all while struggling to get back on their feet and move to a new home. Some families have lost jobs or are working at employment that does not pay sufficient income to meet the bills every month. Others suffer adverse circumstances such as caring for special needs children that demand both time and money that would otherwise be used for working or housing. Family Promise provides social services and day services to help these people find jobs and housing and return to the normalcy of their lives as a family.

For four separate weeks, four families with one or two children have set up their temporary shelter in our Social Hall. Partitions are set up to provide some privacy, and air mattresses for sleeping and breakfast and dinners are provided. During the evenings, volunteers bring dinners and stay to talk with the families, play games with the kids, and “hang out” and be present.

A major thank you to all who participated last year. Without the help and time and energy and delicious food of over 25 volunteers, we would not have been able to provide this much needed service.

We always need people for overnights, evening entertainment and set up and take down. Consider being a Volunteer for Family Promise starting February 10-17. This is a great opportunity for families with children, for the mitzvah, to serve our community at large. Especially in this day, when the world watches as children are being separated from their parents, Family Promise’s aim is to keep families together. Especially during such hard times, Family Promise helps children learn first hand that others are less fortunate, and this is a wonderful time to give to the community around us.

The latkes were served to an appreciative congregation following Rabbi Moritt's December 7 Installation service.


